

Geneviève Claisse decided in her youth for the geometric-abstract art. She worked largely self-taught. In 1958 she had her first solo exhibition at the Galerie Caille in Cambrai and the Galerie Heller in Paris. In 1959 she became assistant to the painter Auguste Herbin. In 1961 she had her first solo exhibition at the Galerie Denise René, from which she was represented from then on. Many group and solo exhibitions in renowned museums followed. 1986–95 she was the French representative in the international Association of Arts (UNESCO).

Geneviève Claisse Cercles

Hans Mayer's first exhibition in Esslingen (1965) was a selection of Josef Albers' "Homage to the Square" paintings. Only a few years later, Hans Mayer then came into contact with the concrete work of Geneviève Claisse (1935 - 2018) through Denise René, with whom he was immediately enthusiastic and repeatedly purchased individual works. Geneviève Claisse's collaboration with Denise René remained very close over a long period of time; Hans Mayer turned to other art movements, but always remained convinced of the quality of

Therefore, at this special moment of our first exhibition after Hans Mayer's death, we would like to show some of Claisse's works, all of which revolve around the motif of the circle. So to speak as "Hommage to the Circle", which closes a circle in the artistic spectrum to the beginning of the gallery with "Hommage to the



Geneviève Claisse (1935-2018) sought, through her paintings and objects, to stimulate individual sensations through a direct abstract language that in turn moved towards a collective experience of art. From the very beginning of her artistic practice as a painter, the shapes circle, square and rectangle formed geometric constants in her pictorial vocabulary. In doing so, she followed a lineage that she picked up through her mentor and uncle, the painter and, among others, co-founder of the artists' group Abstraction-Création, Auguste Herbin, for whom she worked as his assistant in Paris in 1959/60. With her 1961 exhibition at the Galerie Denise René in Paris, which from then on represented her as an artist and through which Hans Mayer encountered Claisse's work, Claisse also formulated an early contribution to Op Art with her Geometric Abstraction paintings, not least through her kinetic rotating objects. The intention of a non-figurative gesture pursued by Claisse was above all to turn away from narrative motifs - a transgression of the narrative through concrete compositional and colour arrangements towards a "topography of forms"² formed by colour sounds, through which one's own seeing can be constituted.

With the exhibition Geneviève Claisse - Cercles, the Galerie Hans Mayer now links the beginnings of the gallery with the gallery's progress in the first exhibition after Hans Mayer's death. The motif of the circle may be read symbolically and is as well a concrete reference to Hans Mayer's very first exhibition in Esslingen in 1965, in which he showed pictures from Josef Albers' series Homage to the Square. Albers, who associated "colour seeing"³ and "colour thinking"⁴ with each other in relation to the attainment of a way of seeing that he thought of in terms of a "world view"⁵ - as a "responsive eye"⁶ - resonated with the attitude of the young gallery owner Mayer. The current exhibition Geneviève Claisse - Cercles takes up this thinking and, with a selection of paintings, silkscreens and kinetic objects, brings to the fore the motif of the circle, to which Claisse has given meaning in her artistic practice in a variety of references.

Geneviève Claisse was the French representative in the International Association of Art (UNESCO) from 1986-95. Her first institutional solo exhibition in Germany was organised in 2007 as a retrospective at the Museum Ritter in Waldenbuch. It is the concern of Galerie Hans Mayer to give her work, of whose quality Hans Mayer was convinced, new visibility with this presentation at Schmela Haus.





Cercles bleu 1967 Oil on canvas 74 x 50.5 cm 30 000 €






